Peter: Failures Redeemed; Life & Call Restored
John 21:1-19

All of us who are growing as devoted followers of Christ still experience times of failure. Times when we give in to our self-centeredness and human desires and impulses instead of loving God and following Him in loving obedience. However, as we see in the life of Peter and the other Apostles, Jesus desires to redeem our failures and restore our lives and our call to know and follow Him. It starts with our decision to repent from our sin instead of just regretting our sin. Then Jesus does His redeeming and restoring work as we experience the Destiny He has for us!

## REPENTANCE VERSUS REGRETTING

**Regretting:** Focuses on ourselves and the consequences of our actions. Often leads either to defensiveness or defeatedness.

**Repentance:** Focuses on God and our relationship with Him. We take ownership of our sin, confess it and determine that by God's grace we will change course and honor Him with our obedience.

1. David wrote Psalm 51 in response to his sins of adultery, deceit, and murder with Bathsheba and her husband Uriah. It is one of the clearest descriptions of true repentance found in the Bible. If it has been awhile since you read this story refresh your memory by reading 2 Samuel 11 and 12. Then after reading Psalm 51, answer the following questions:
As you read verses 1-9, how does David express ownership of his sin and focus on God and his relationship with God?
Now read verses 10-15. How does David express a determination to change course and honor God with loving obedience?
What part does God and His grace play in this change?
Finally, read verses 16-17. Verse 16 describes worship in David's day. How might we rewrite this verse so it reflects our worship experience on Sunday mornings?
Why do you think God wants us to experience brokenness and humility before entering into worship?
Take a few moments to ask God to reveal any area of your life or specific sin He wants you to repent of, and then pray this Psalm back to Him.
